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From the Bishop

Dear Friends,

As happens about three times every century, Ash Wednesday and Valentine's Day fall on the same day this year. It makes me think about how they are connected. Or, as Tina Turner's song puts it, "What's love got to do with it?"

A while back I did a little research on how Valentine's Day originated. Back around the year 270CE in the city of Rome, there did indeed live a man named Valentine, who was later recognized as a Christian saint. Archeologists have found a stone in the ruins of a Christian church in Rome dating to 370CE that has on it an inscription to a Saint Valentine.

There are no clear historical documents about who Valentine was or what he did, but a number of Christian legends have grown up about him. One legend says that he was a Christian priest in Rome at a time when Emperor Claudius was persecuting Christians. One of the things that Claudius did was to pass a decree forbidding the marriage of Christian couples. Valentine ignored the decree and, when Christian couples would come to him in secret, he would marry them. As a result, Valentine was arrested by Claudius and later executed, but became known as a patron saint of lovers. (He is also the patron saint of beekeepers and those with epilepsy.)

A second legend, which is a variation of the first, is that when Claudius arrested Valentine and put him in prison, the jailer in charge of the prison brought his young, blind daughter to Valentine, hoping that Valentine could heal her. The jailer had heard that Valentine was skilled at medicine and healing.

Valentine had compassion for her and prescribed various herbal medicines and ointments. He also began teaching her each day about Roman history, mathematics, science, and about God, our loving creator revealed in Jesus Christ. The night before Valentine was executed by Claudius, he wrote one last note to his young friend, urging her to always stay close to God and love God above all else. He signed the letter, "From your Valentine." Many years later, in the year 496CE, Pope Gelasius I decreed February 14 to be Saint Valentine's day.

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What's love got to do with Ash Wednesday? Ash Wednesday carries multiple meanings of cleansing, decision-making, and a call to hope in a gracious, life-giving God. "Dust you are and to dust you will return." You don't usually see that on a Valentine's Day card. However, that urgency poses the question, as Mary Oliver puts it, "What do you plan to do with your one wild and precious life?"

Embraced by and infused with God's constant and gracious love, Ash Wednesday impels us to entrust ourselves to God and to live the life God that gives us with hope. In love, God gathers us as the Beloved Community. In love, God brings cleansing and healing for our wounds. With hope, we participate with God and our neighbors in creating God's loving shalom in our midst. Love has everything to do with it.
